The staff at Nexus had a profound impact on my life and put me in a position where I can feel great.

Jack Wright fell 32 feet through a skylight after his harness broke. He sustained many injuries, including a traumatic brain injury. After nearly four months in a trauma center and specialty hospital, Jack transferred to Nexus Neurorecovery Center.

"When he first arrived, Jack was in a wheelchair and had limited mobility," explained Pam McManus, Jack's fiancée. "They got him to where he could walk again and helped with other challenges, too, like his behavioral issues."

Participating in physical, occupational, and speech therapy, Jack worked towards his personal goals which included walking again. He shared, "I can't commend the staff enough. Everyone handled me with care and consideration. They helped me readjust to society and feel like a human again. It took me four months, but I got out of the wheelchair. They were with me every step of the way."

Jack enjoyed the vocational program, spending most of his time in the horticulture center. He tended to the plants around campus and earned a paycheck for his work. He was most proud of the moment he rang the honor bell for the first time, saying: "I rang the bell after I received my first paycheck for the work I did."

Working with different departments on campus, Jack continued to make great progress. Pam said, "All the therapists had a profound effect on his life. They worked really hard at building a structure for him that was geared towards his skills and needs, because they take each individual and tailor their care to them."

Now that Jack has discharged from Nexus Neurorecovery Center, he says he's embracing life and has never felt better. "God gave me a reason to live. I died when I hit the ground and the EMS brought me back to life. Then I was in a coma for a month and here I am now. The staff at Nexus had a profound impact on my life and put me in a position where I can feel great."

Recently, Jack gave his testimony in front of the congregation at his church, Encounter. He received a standing ovation. Pam explained, "We're going to continue telling his story. Jack went from being a person who was in prison to where he is now. We want to share his story to show people what the Lord can do."
